WHAT THE MID-STATE AMATEUR RADIO CLUB HAS TO OFFER.

*MARC maintains two repeaters covering the Johnson County and surrounding area.

The 146.835 MHz repeater is an analog-only repeater and is the primary Skywarn repeater for Johnson County. The 443.525 MHz repeater is an Analog/Digital system using the YAESU DR-1X C4FM/FM Digital Repeater. Both use a 151.4 Hz PL tone for input and output. These repeaters are free and open to all licensed radio amateurs for their use.

- * MARC maintains an APRS digipeater on the frequency of 144.39 MHz. This digipeater allows local hams to send packets to the worldwide APRS network.
- *MARC sponsors a weekly open to all amateur's traffic and social net on our VHF repeater. The net begins at 7:00 pm local time every Sunday featuring local news, announcements, NTS traffic, as well as rebroadcasts of Amateur Radio Newsline.
